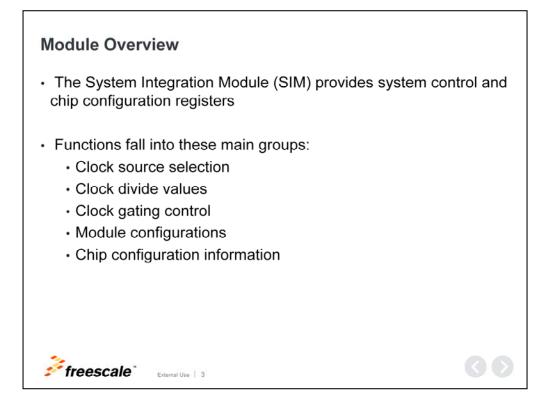

Let's first begin with an overview of the module.





Module Overview

The System Integration Module, or SIM, is essentially a glue logic block that provides control of system-on-chip inputs to almost all of the modules on the chip.

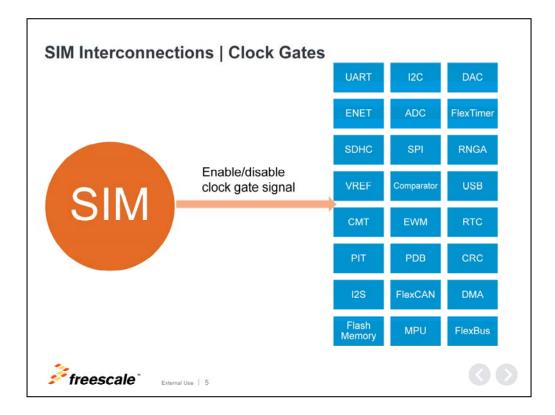
The main functions of the SIM are clock source selection, clock divide values, clock gating control, module configurations and chip configuration information.





Now, let's talk about on-chip interconnections and inter-module dependencies.

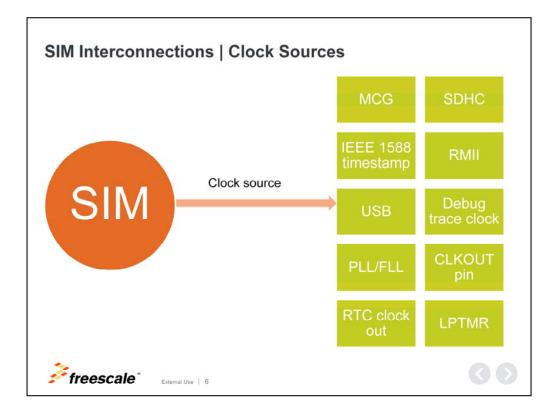




SIM Interconnections | Clock Gates

The SIM interconnects to almost all modules on the chip, **and controls the clock** gates.

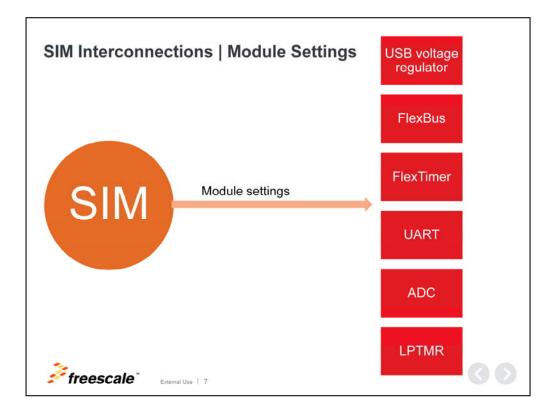




SIM Interconnections | Clock Sources

The SIM interconnects to almost all modules on the chip, **and selects the clock sources.**





SIM Interconnections | Module Settings

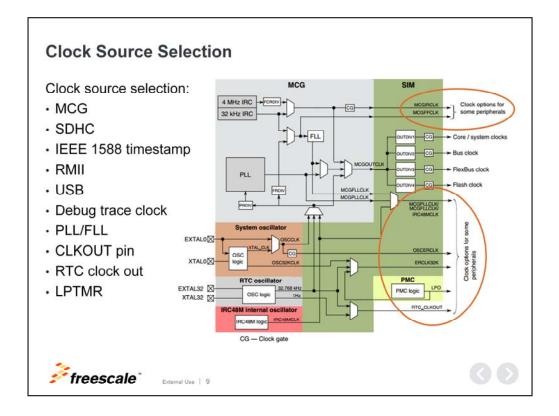
The SIM interconnects to almost all modules on the chip, **and can configure the settings of many modules.**





In this next section we'll cover software configuration.

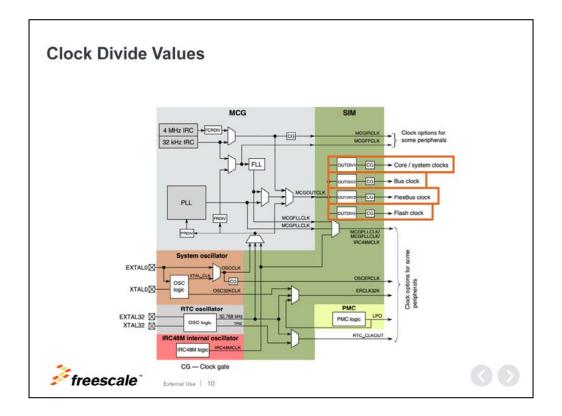




Clock Source Selection

The SIM offers clock source selection for modules that have the option of selecting their clock source, such as the SDHC module, Ethernet timestamp, USB and debug trace clock.



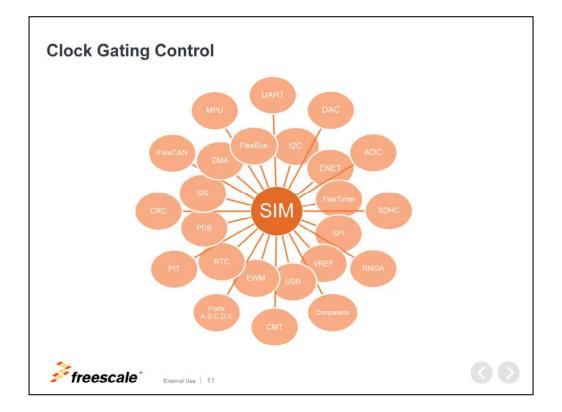


Clock Divide Values

The SIM can also modify the output dividers of the:

- Core clock
- Bus clock
- FlexBus clock
- And Flash clock



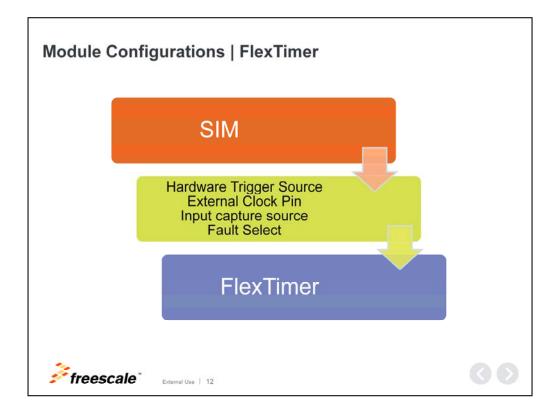


Clock Gating Control

By default, most module clocks are disabled. The SIM allows you to enable or disable the clock gate to most modules on a per module basis.

To reduce power consumption, disable the clock for modules that are not used.

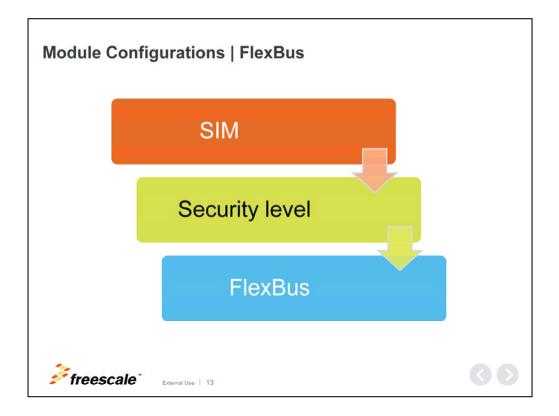




Module Configurations | FlexTimer

The SIM allows you to configure several module settings. For example, the Flextimer hardware trigger source, the external pin used to drive the clock or the input capture source and fault source.

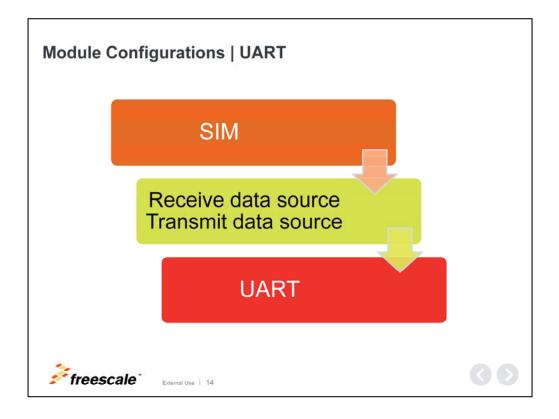




Module Configurations | FlexBus

The SIM allows you to configure several module settings. For example, **the** security level of the FlexBus.

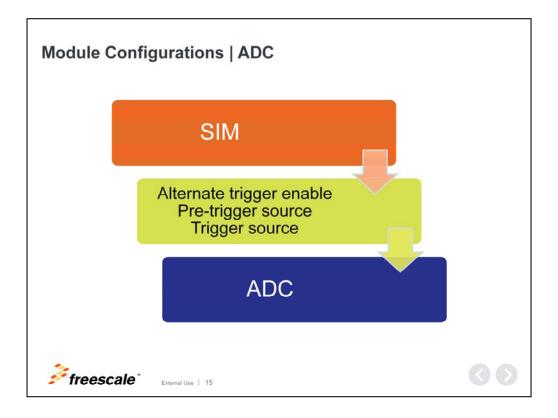




Module Configurations | UART

The SIM allows you to configure several module settings. For example, **selecting the UART receive and transmit sources.**

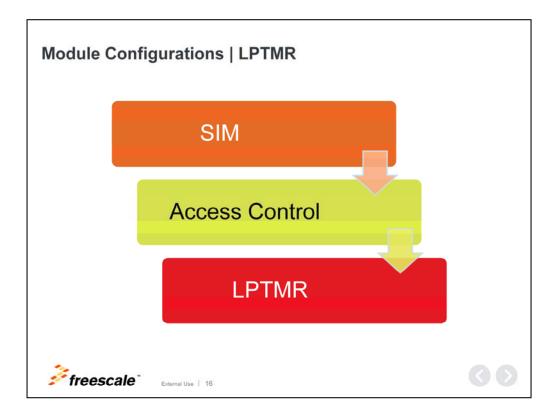




Module Configurations | ADC

The SIM allows you to configure several module settings. For example, **selecting alternative conversion triggers, trigger and pre-trigger sources for the ADC module.**

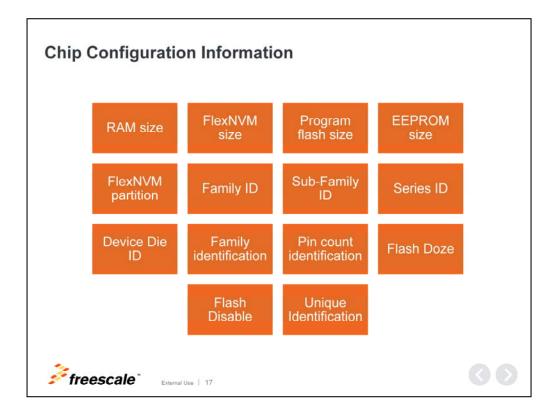




Module Configurations | LPTMR

The SIM allows you to configure several module settings. For example, **controlling the software access to the low-power timer module (LPTMR).**





Chip Configuration Information

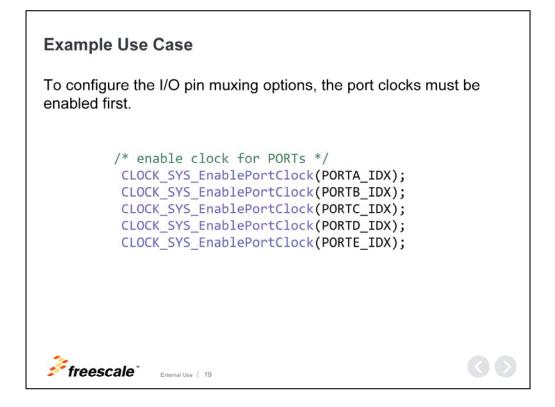
The SIM stores chip configuration information. This information can be useful if you have multiple versions of product with slightly different feature sets. For example, if you have one product with USB and another without USB, then at run time, your code could use the family ID value to determine which version of the product is running. This makes code maintenance and releases easier to track. However, this also makes the overall code size larger due to the inclusion of code for features that might not be supported.





Now, let's review an example use case.

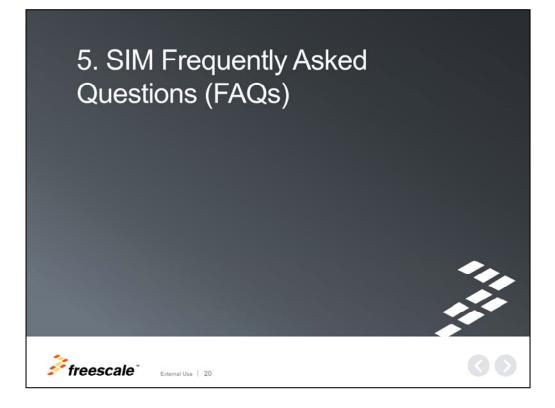




Example Use Case

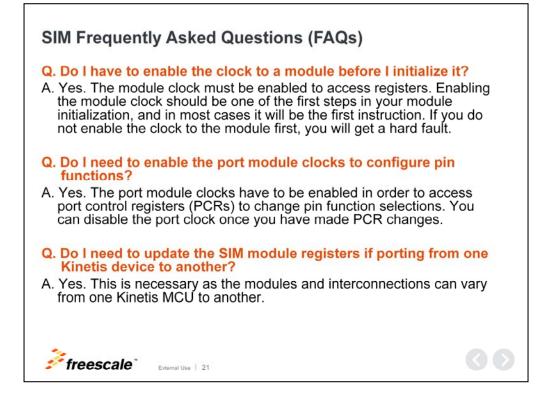
In this example, we enable the MCU port clocks A, B, C, D and E by using the CLOCK_SYS_EnablePortClock function of Kinetis SDK. This allows the pin functions to be configured at a later time.





Finally, some frequently asked questions about the SIM module:





SIM Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

Q: Do I have to enable the clock to a module before I initialize it?

A: Yes, the module clock must be enabled to access registers. Enabling the module clock should be one of the first steps in your module initialization, and in most cases it will be the first instruction. If you don't enable the clock to the module first, you will get a hard fault.

Q: Do I need to enable the port module clocks to configure pin functions?

A: Yes, the port module clocks have to be enabled in order to access port control registers, or PCRs, to change pin function selections. You can disable the port clock once you've made PCR changes.

Q: Do I need to update the SIM registers if porting from one Kinetis device to another?

A: Yes. This is necessary as the modules and interconnections may vary from one Kinetis MCU to another.
